

HISPANIC/LATINO COMMUNITIES & BREAST CANCER

To understand breast cancer inequities among Hispanic and Latino communities across the U.S., Susan G. Komen's Center for Applied Research is conducting a landscape analysis to explore national breast cancer statistics, demographic and social needs data, and the lived experiences of Hispanic and Latino communities impacted by breast cancer.

BREAST CANCER IN HISPANIC WOMEN

- Breast cancer is the most common cancer. among Hispanic women in the U.S.
- Hispanic women in the U.S. are more likely to be diagnosed with breast cancer at more advanced stages and with larger and more difficult-to-treat tumors compared to white women.
- The 5-year breast cancer survival rate among Hispanic women in the U.S. is lower than white women.
- Screening rates among Hispanic women in the U.S. are slightly lower than the national screening rate.

WHAT IS KOMEN DOING?

Komen Patient Care Center

- Since launching in 2020, Komen's Patient Care Center served nearly 15,000 individuals who identify as Hispanic/Latino.
- Komen provided \$4,583,440 in financial assistance to 9.254 individuals in Hispanic/Latino communities.

Hispanic/Latino Landscape Analysis

- Komen will continue to research Hispanic/Latino communities' experiences with breast cancer and health care to address barriers that drive inequities. The study will explore:
 - Health care systems
 - **Built environment**
 - Public policy
 - Health care access
 - Social and community system
